### **PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE**

The man who was my pastor when I was young gave me a piece of advice when I entered the ministry. What he told me was to always be reading, because what I read would influence what I preached, how I preached, and the depth of my preaching. I have always been a reader. I thought myself an avid reader before I married Mandi, and quickly realized that I do not read nearly the number of books that some people do. However, at the time I didn't fully grasp the significance of what my pastor had said. I even doubted him a little in wondering how books and magazines I read for fun or my own edification could possibly spill over into my preaching. Suffice to say, I was wrong. As an example, I recently re-subscribed to a magazine that I used to avidly await new issues of: Texas Architect. I let my subscription lapse when we moved to Comanche and decided I needed to take the subscription again as we worked on establishing our new normal here. I received my first issue in the mail just the other day and have been reminded why I loved the magazine. One of the fundamentals I learned early in my time as a student of architecture is that good design is relevant to all aspects of life. I remember taking my history of architecture courses and learning so much of world history through the history of the built environment. As I read my first issue of Texas Architect since my subscription lapse, some of these things that have grown somewhat hazy have come back to me. In the Editor's Note writing about Austin architect O'Niel Ford and his struggles with the issues of his day, such as "usurpation and defamation of land by vulgarians and the construction of square miles of shacks", Aaron Seward wrote:

One of the most heartening results of studying the writings of those who have come before us, as well as the most disturbing, is to discover how much our time has in common with times past. Heartening because it's possible to find succor in the accounts of those who have labored under circumstances and conditions that, if they don't precisely mirror our own, at least prefigure them. Disturbing because, in spite of these histories and lessons they convey, the same troubles persist, often in metastasized form.

Though I'm not nearly as eloquent in expressing my ideas as Mr. Seward, I feel much the same way he does, about architecture, life, and also when I read scripture. One great misconception of the Bible (both outside the church and even within it) is that it is not relevant to our time. As a pastor, I know I should be above such thoughts, but how often have I caught myself thinking when reading scripture, "Wow! I've experienced this exact same issue in my life. I can't believe they had to deal with these things in the Bible too." To borrow a phrase, it's heartening to me because I can find that God's people have dealt with many of the same issues we do today, that God has led them through it, and will lead us through it. Disturbing, in that we have the witness of scripture to help teach, instruct, and guide us and yet we so often fall into the same mistakes we read about in the Bible. It truly seems that the more things change, the more they stay the same. Unable to sometimes overcome our own failings, the truth remains: we really need God's help.

Like parents who try to raise their children to avoid the mistakes of their own past, God seeks to lead us away from the common pitfalls of earthly life into something more, His own kingdom on earth. To achieve this however, we, as God's people need to not only be attentive to God's future - which He leads us to by the guidance of the Holy Spirit, but we also need to be attentive to the past. We have much to learn from looking back, if we are willing to. In scripture we find so many people who have known our struggles and have made our mistakes. Jesus himself lived our life and died our death, so that by His grace we are freed for something more. It all begins for us with the Bible, and it continues with the Bible. If we are to learn from the children of God who have gone before, we must regularly engage with scripture. In it we find our past, our common struggles, and our way toward a Spirit-led tomorrow all under God's guidance.

## Exciting things are happening in the Children's LYFE Groups

With the change from Sunday School programs, to LYFE (Living Your Faith Everyday) Groups, the Children's ministry has made some recent changes as well. Last month, we began utilizing a new way of doing LYFE groups for children 3<sup>rd</sup> grade and younger. (Room 26 kids will continue with their Life Application curriculum with Bill and Russell.)

LYFE group leaders will be using a rotation model in order to really help the children understand Bible stories and concepts more thoroughly. What this means is your child's leader will remain the same each week, but they will be discussing the same story or lesson for an entire month. The fun part of this is that they will learn it in a new way each week.

In September, they focused on the Fruits of the Spirit. They began by doing an art project. We utilized games, food, and science to further develop their knowledge of the Fruits of the Spirit. 
